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Part – IV – Recommendations

A. Observations of the Committee

- The Mangalayatan University was established by an Act of Madhya Pradesh Private University Regulatory Commission, 2007 passed by the state legislature of Madhya Pradesh followed by the gazette notification no.36 dated September, 2020.
- The name of the Mangalayatan University is included in the list of universities by UGC as per section 2(f) of UGC, 1956 on the receipt of the copies of the University Act and gazette notification from the university. There by empowers the university to award the degree programmes without the approval of UGC.
- The approval for professional programmes such as Law, Pharmacy, Agriculture, Engineering etc. have been sought from Bar Council of India, Pharmacy Council of India, Indian Council of Agricultural Research and the programmes shall be governed by the norms and regulations of the respective councils.
- The university has adequate infrastructure and facilities, qualified and experienced academic staff, sound financial management and an appropriate academic curriculum that meets the requirements of the UGC.
- The university complies with the guidelines and regulations set by UGC, which include the minimum duration of academic programs, the maximum student-teacher ratio and the minimum requirements for students.
- The private university is in the early stages and it is early to predict the outcomes in graduate achievements, national rankings and research productivity.
- The university is fostering collaboration with industries that aims to enhance the career prospects of the students.

B. Suggestions of the Committee which require satisfactory compliance by the University

- The university has the potential to meet the growing demand for higher education not only in the state of Madhya Pradesh but from the entire country as well as for international students provided they have residential facilities for students and faculty.
- The courses and programmes offered by the university are limited in number. Therefore, diversifying educational opportunities and promoting innovation in higher education.
- The university needs to strengthen the academic research with industry partners to gain contextual knowledge by sending their faculty in faculty development and exchange and academia-industry exchange programmes.
- As the job market is prioritizing skills over qualification, the university should design the curriculum to equip the students with theoretical knowledge and potential skills relevant to their career choices.
- Primacy should be given by the university towards facilitating student's career development and elevate the university into centres of excellence and hubs for quality workforce to the job market.
- The university needs to have more flexibility in programme offerings, course schedules and admission requirements, making them attractive to students who may not meet the criteria for admissions to private university.
- In the era of emerging technologies and ever growing quantities of data, impact of library operations and transforming the scale of capacities is pivotal. Therefore, the university library should expand its digital resources by increasing the subscriptions in e-journals, e-books and academic data base.
- The backbone of any modern university is its network infrastructure. The university needs to augment its digital infrastructure by increasing bandwidth and improving the wi-fi coverage across the campus to support high speed internet access in all classrooms, libraries, hostels and common facilities.
- The university may setup Centre of excellence on tribal languages and cultural heritage and cultural heritage at Mangalayatan University, Jabalpur that may serve as a dedicated hub for the documentation, preservation and revitalization of endangered tribal languages and the rich cultural heritage of tribal communities of the region.
- The university must consider setting up an innovation and incubation center to promote innovation and entrepreneurship among students and faculty.
- Faculty of Agriculture has started three courses (03) in Under Graduate Programme and three courses in Post Graduate Programmes. All these courses are running only with four laboratories, limited class rooms and field-farm facilities. Special attention is required to create farm/laboratories/workshop facilities for B. Sc. (Hons) Forestry and B. Sc. (Hons) Horticulture programmes.

- Laboratories need to be upgraded for Master's degree programmes. Experiential learning programmes/Student READY need to be in place as per the recommendations of ICAR.
- Minimum requirements for teaching/non-teaching staff, laboratories and specialized instructional farms should be ensured at the earliest.
- Separate academic block for agriculture should be constructed wherein all departments of agriculture, forestry and horticulture could be placed together to support teaching and research.

C. Final Recommendations

In efforts to fulfill the mandate of the UGC in accordance with its regulations, the UGC Expert Committee (including representatives from the concerned statutory councils) conducted virtual inspection of Mangalayatan University on 08.08.2024 & 09.08.2024 to assess the fulfillment of minimum criteria in terms of academic programmes, faculty, infrastructure facilities, financial viability etc. In this regard, it is pertinent to note the following:

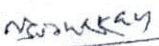
- The Mangalayatan University, Jabalpur is a unitary university having adequate facilities for teaching, research, examinations and extension services.
- The university is providing first degree and/or post graduate degree/doctoral programmes in accordance with the relevant UGC Regulations.
- The university fulfills the minimum criteria in terms of programmes, faculty, infrastructural facilities, financial viability etc. as laid down from time to time by the UGC and other concerned statutory councils such as All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE), Bar Council of India (BCI), the Pharmacy Council of India (PCI) and Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR).
- The committee has viewed and geotagged the common facilities such as library, seminar halls, e-classrooms, sports utilities both indoor and outdoor, examination branch, administrative buildings, laboratories for pharmacy, computer science, forensics, agricultural fields and sheds etc.
- The committee has verified the society's act, relevant documents pertaining to course approvals of the respective statutory councils, trust documents, admission brochure and other relevant documents.
- The committee has interacted with the Chancellor, Vice Chancellor, Faculty, Non-teaching staff, Students and Management of Mangalayatan University.

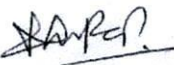
Based on the above, the conclusions we draw are as follows:

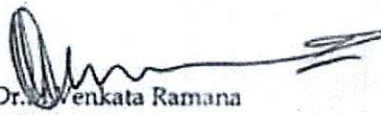
